What is 「Haiku」?:

A Haiku is a short poem that uses imagistic language to convey the essence of an experience of nature or the season intuitively linked to the human condition.

(Quoted from the Haiku Society of America"HSA"'s definition of Haiku.)

Haiku is a symbolic form of poetry that has ceased to be eloquent.

A. 日本語「俳句」

- 1. 「俳句」の作り方 :
 - * 17 音節 (おんせつ: 5-7-5 moras "Japanese syllables") で作るのが望ましい。
 - * 季節の言葉(季語: kigo)を一つ入れて下さい(季節感を盛り込む)。
 - * 俳句は、異なったイメージやアイデアを一句の中に並記(juxtapose)させるのが 一般的な作り方です。 これを「切れ (kire) (前後の内容が切れている部分) が ある俳句」と言い、短い俳句の内容を大きくふくらませてくれる働きがあります。
- 2. (a)「俳句」の <u>Example 1.</u>

「古池や蛙飛びこむ水の音(ふるいけや/かわずとびこむみずのおと)」(芭蕉 Basho) この俳句は、

- *古池(ふるいけ furuike) 4音節+や(ya) 1音節=5音節、 かわず kawazu(かえるの 別名) 3音節+飛びこむ(tobikomu) 4音節=7音節、 水(みず mizu) 2音節+の(no) 1音節+音(おと oto) 2音節=5音節、即ち5-7-5=17音節から成り立ってます。
- *「蛙(かわず)」は「春」を表す季節の言葉(季語 kigo)です。
- *「古池や」と「蛙飛びこむ水の音」の間に「切れ(kire)」が入ってます(/ で示す)。「や」を切字(kireji:cutting word)と言います。

2. (b)「俳句」の Example 2. :

「レマン湖のひかりに熟れて葡萄畑 (れまんこのひかりにうれてぶどうばた)」

(作者:鷹羽 狩行 Takaha Shugyo)

この俳句は、

- *レマン湖 (れまんこ remanko) 4音節+の(no)1音節=5音節、 ひかり(hikari) 3音節+に(ni)1音節+熟れ (うれ ure) 2音節+て (te) 1音節=7音節、 葡萄畑(ぶどうばた budoubata)5音節、 すなわち5-7-5の17音節から成り立ってます。
- *レマン湖(LacLéman, LakeGeneva)日本人が外国で俳句を作る事を海外詠と言います。
- *「葡萄畑」はぶどうの収穫にちなむ「秋」の季節の言葉(季語 kigo)です。
- *この句の場合、異なったイメージを並記(juxtapose)して作っている訳ではなく、 一つの句の中に一つのテーマだけを集中して詠むことで、強い切れ (kire) が ない17音節で表現を完結させています。 対象を深く掘り下げる「1句1章 ikku issho(1 verse 1 chapter)」と表現されることもあります。 このような別のタイプの俳句の作り方もあります。
- * An attempt to translate this Haiku into English: (Translated by Hiroshi Goto)

Remanko no vineyards ripen in

hikari ni urete ==> sunlight pours down brilliantly

budoubata over Lake Geneva

3. いろいろな日本の季節の言葉「季語 kigo」を知るには?

本屋または図書館に行くと多くの「歳時記 saijiki」または「季寄せ kiyose」と云う名前の本があります。「歳時記 saijiki」は各季節(春、夏、秋、冬および正月)にちなむ行事・出来事・動植物・天文その他の季語 kigo がまとめられていて、その説明もあります。 「季寄せ kiyose」はそれの簡略化したものです。皆さん、それぞれ調べてみて下さい。

B. 「Haiku」in English

1. How to compose Haiku in English:

Haiku is the content and not the form alone that composes it.

- * Please write in 3 lines.
- * It doesn't require the 5-7-5 syllables.

Instead try to write in such brief length as if of one or two breaths in reading.

* The most common technique of Haiku is juxtaposing two images or ideas.

This can be done by using "kire", or a cut in the middle of Haiku.

- * Try to include a season word that tells which season your Haiku is about.
- * English Haiku doesn't have to rhyme.

- 3. Examples of Haiku in English:
 - (a) English translation of Basho's Haiku (listed above):

(There are many many English translations of this famous Haiku.)

An example: (Translated by Donald Keene)

Furu ike ya The ancient pond

Kawazu tobikomu ==> A frog leaps in

mizu no oto The sound of the water.

* "The ancient pond" and "A frog leaps in" are not meant to be read in one flow.

There is no punctuation mark " -- " in the original translation.

However, one idea for composing Haiku in English might be to add "--" to the end of the line to clearly separate the two parts of the phrase.

That is, like this ==> The ancient pond --

By using --; the punctuation at the end of the line, you can indicate that there is a cut in your Haiku. In Japanese we use "ya", the small word called kire-ji "so called cutting word" for this purpose. You, as a reader of Haiku, supposed to feel the void between two parts of one Haiku.

(b) Haiku in English:

Example 1.

A bitter morning:

sparrows sitting together

without any necks

(Author: James W. Hackett)

- * "A bitter morning" is a seasonal word for winter.
- * Between "A bitter morning" and "sparrows sitting together", there is a punctuation mark, i.e., a colon. This works as a cutting word.

 Remember, a cutting word enables you to give birth to vaster and deeper space for your Haiku.

Example 2.

a poof of powder

from the donut bag

spring petals (Author: Michelle Schaefer)

* "A poof of powder from the donut bag" and "spring petals" are two separate images. Even without any kireji, or punctuation mark, you are supposed to feel the cut.

This cut works for readers and they are naturally ushered into the spring breeze!
